### **Organization of Mechanized Infantry/Armored Cavalry Units ...**

The Rifle Company was the main maneuver unit of the Armored Infantry Battalion and the typical mechanized infantry company in the U.S. Army during World War II, equivalent to the German Panzergrenadiers (although most Panzergrenadier units were mounted in trucks rather than half-tracks). The company was made up of the Company Headquarters, 1 Antitank Platoon, 3 Rifle Platoons and an attached medical vehicle.
