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 The difference between a school counselor and school psychologist is that school counselor focuses on the students having a less severe mental illness whereas school psychologist concentrates on the students having severe mental illness. School Counselor vs. School Psychologist.
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The American School Counselor Association (ASCA) recommends a student-to-school-counselor ratio of 250:1, although the average ratio is currently 471:1. Do School Counselors Diagnose Mental Health ...

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School Psychologist (MA, MS, EdS): Trained in psychology with an education and child development emphasis. Marriage, Family, and Child Counselor (MFT, MFCC- MA, MS): Training in psychology or social work.

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Understanding the differences in school counselors vs. school psychologists could make it easier to decide which career would be the best fit for one's own interests and professional goals. Those who want to serve as the first line of defense in supporting student development should consider setting their sights on earning a master's in counseling.

Techniques Used in School Psychology. School psychologists utilize many of the following techniques in their practice: Collect and interpret student data; Conduct assessments of academic and of a psychological nature; Facilitate individual and group counseling; Assess emotional, learning and behavioral needs of students

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School Psychologists vs School Counselors. There are significant differences in the roles of school psychologists and school counselors. Typically, school psychologists work primarily with populations with special needs; the National Association of School Psychologists notes that their positions are often funded with special education moneys.

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Most states require a doctorate to earn clinical licensure as a psychologist, but some states may allow those with a master's to work as a counselor. An internship or practicum of supervised clinical experience. The American Board of Professional Psychology (ABPP) requires a one-year, full-time or two-year, part-time internship.

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
