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Towards a Poor Theatre contains texts by Jerzy Grotowski (1933-1999), interviews with him, and other supplementary material presenting his method and training. Originally published in 1968, it has established itself as a classic work on theatre.

To be clear, this book is not an instruction manual, and it is worthy study for the serious student of physical theatre, theatre history, and movement- but understand that it is a challenging book and much of it may not seem to be immediately practical.
